Fruit 'N' Yogurt Swirl Pops



Ingredients

- 1 lb. fresh or frozen fruit
- 2 tbsp. granulated sugar (only if using fresh fruit)
- 2 c. vanilla yogurt
- Ice pop molds (see Note)
- 10 ice pop sticks

Directions

- 1. Using a food processor, purée the fruit (and sugar, if using fresh fruit) until smooth. Pour into a resealable bag or squeeze bottle.
- 2. Spoon the yogurt into a resealable bag or squeeze bottle. If using resealable bags, snip off a corner from each. Alternately squeeze the yogurt and purée into the molds to create swirls. Insert sticks according to directions and freeze overnight.













Birth control methods include IUDs and implants, Depo-Provera (the shot), birth control pills, female and male condoms, abstinence education, and fertility awareness based methods (natural family planning).

More Program Information

Safe Cribs for Missouri Program

The Safe Cribs for Missouri Program is a provider of last resort for clients who have no full size or portable crib and no other resource for obtaining one. The program requires clients to participate in two individual safe sleep educational sessions provided by the health department. The first session is conducted prior to the client receiving the crib and typically takes place in the office. This session teaches the client about safe sleeping environments for infants. The second session is a follow-up session to assess the use of the crib and typically takes place over the phone. There are eligibility requirements regarding obtaining a crib.

Communicable Disease Surveillance and Reporting

Missouri has 116 reportable communicable diseases such as tuberculosis, measles, whooping cough, hepatitis, and meningitis. Local health care providers are required to report such diseases to the Health Department. A Public Health Nurse and Environmental Public Health Specialists investigate and follow up on reported communicable diseases in order to identify the origin of the disease, control the further spread, and prevent a recurrence. Diseases like hepatitis, measles, salmonella, tuberculosis, brucellosis, rabies, meningitis and many more are reported to our agency. BCHD provides follow-up on contacts (family or friends) of these patients, and provides some services for the patients themselves.

Show Me Health Women Program

Show Me Healthy Women (SMHW) began in 1992, and is Missouri's implementation of the National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (NBCCEDP). It provides free breast and cervical cancer screenings throughout Missouri, for women meeting certain age, income, and insurance guidelines. SMHW is funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and several national, regional, and local partner organizations. The Butler County Health Department offers services as part of the Show Me Healthy Women program which include, clinical breast exams(CBE), screening mammograms for women age 50-64 (target population), screening mammograms for women 40-49 using alternate funds, if available, pap tests, pelvic exams, specialist consultation (breast and cervical), and diagnostic mammograms.

STD/HIV Prevention Education

The STD/HIV Prevention Program focuses on helping people understand their risk for STD/HIV infection and reduces their risk for becoming infected or infecting others. Social marketing is an important part of all STD/HIV prevention, and is accomplished by gaining an understanding of how and why target audiences behave as they do, convincing individuals to exchange unhealthy behaviors for healthy ones by showing the benefits of change and strategic management of prevention programs. This is accomplished through various programs offered by BCHD. These programs include STD/HIV Health Education/Risk Reduction, Community Education, Community Planning, and Early Intervention.

The Butler County Health Department offers Covid vaccinations every Friday from 8am - 3:30pm. Late night clinics are available once a month from 5pm - 7pm. Please call 573-785-8478 to schedule an appointment. The following vaccinations are currently being provided by the health department:

- The Pfizer vaccine is available (1st and 2nd dose).
- Bivalent boosters are available.
- The Novavax vaccine is available to ages 12y and older, however, there are no boosters available for this vaccine at this time.







The Butler County Health Department currently has a Narcan vending machine available in the lobby.

Narcan located in the vending machine is free of charge and there is no training or identification required. There are vouchers and Narcan instruction sheets on the wall to the right of the machine.

Narcan is a potentially lifesaving medication designed to help reverse the effects of an opioid overdose in minutes. Since most opioid overdoses occur in the home and are most often witnessed, having a Narcan rescue kit nearby can make all the difference.




Missouri is home to a large population of ticks, which means tick-borne diseases can pose an increased risk for individuals who work or play outside. At least six different types of tick-borne diseases have been reported in Missouri residents; these diseases include Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Ehrlichiosis, Tularemia, Lyme disease, and disease caused by Heartland and Bourbon virus. The majority of cases occur during the months of May, June, and July. Symptoms of each disease typically includes headache, sudden fever, and body aches. Symptoms can begin within two weeks of being bitten by an infected tick. Not all ticks are infected, therefore, a tick bite does not necessarily mean you will get a disease. Taking precautions such as using insect repellant, wearing protective clothing, avoiding infested areas, and checking for ticks after being outdoors reduces the chance for tick-borne diseases.

The health department is accepting book donations for the Little Red Bookshelf Program. This program allows children who visit the health department to take a book from the bookshelf home with them.
